- 3. The Servant of God
- 4. The Holy One of Israel
- 5. The Messiah

- 1. Uzziah, also called Azariah (781-740 BC)
- 2. Jotham, son of Uzziah (740 BC-736 BC)
- 3. Ahaz, son of Jotham (736-716 BC)
- 4. Hezekiah, son of Ahaz (716-687 BC)

Each of the image groups consist of four parts:

- ◆ Part I: Yahweh and his people enter into a covenant relationship. Yahweh will bind this people to Himself in the blessings of security and prosperity in return for obedience to the covenant of the Torah (first 5 books of Moses)
- Part II: Israel, the covenant people ignore the Laws of the covenant; they rebel by going their own way
- ♦ Part III: God sends His holy prophet to call His people back to Him. Failing in this mission the prophet, calls down a Covenant Lawsuit (riv) which results in covenant curses—redemptive punishment meant to bring about repentance and restoration
- ◆ Part IV: In response to repentance, Yahweh reaches out to restore and to take His people back into the fullness of His covenant relationship.

Isaiah described the qualifications of the ideal Davidic Messiah king whose rule contrasted with the reign of Davidic King Ahaz (736-716 BC; 2 Kng 16:1-20). The role of the ideal Davidic king remained unfulfilled until the coming of Jesus the Messiah and His Kingdom of the Church:

Isaiah laid out every aspect of the ministry and glory of the future Redeemer-Messiah. Isaiah's prophecies of fulfillment that will be perfectly accomplished in the mission of Jesus of Nazareth:

- 1. His incarnation (Is 7:14; 9:6)
- 2. His early years (Is 7:15; 11:1; 53:2)
- 3. His manner (Is 42:2)
- 4. His obedience (Is 50:5)
- 5. His message (Is 61:1-2)
- 6. His miracles (Is 35:5-6)
- 7. His sufferings, rejection, and vicarious death (Is 50:6; 53:1-12)
- 8. His exaltation and glory (Is 52:13)

Probably the most dramatic of Isaiah's prophecies that are fulfilled in Jesus of Nazareth are Isaiah's four "Servant Songs" (42:1-4; 49:1-6; 50:4-9 and 52:13-53:12) that are fulfilled in Jesus' ministry and His Passion.
